

Teachers are lifelong learners and have to be, if they want to keep up with their students and prepare them for the future. In the last ve years, teachers in general have faced and conquered many challenges, especially with rewriting work programs for the Australian Curriculum, with its implementation and reviews and rewrites, and coping with constant Senior Syllabus Reviews, and now the preparation for the soon to be implemented Senior External Assessment System. At Citipointe, during this time, our school has undergone a technological revolution: we changed to Synergetic, our new systems management program, which we use now as the primary repository for all student information; we implemented Blackboard, our content and learning management system, which contains all curriculum, learning, resource and assessment materials for access by students and parents. Blackboard has also become a major communication channel for teachers and students, especially for submission, feedback and return of assessment work; moreover, it enables more e ective academic discussion between students and teachers, and students and other students. As well, the College implemented the 1:1 iPad program which is now in its second year. The use of iPads together with access to Blackboard has changed the way teachers teach, enabling students to access timely and diverse sources of information


Current area to be redeveloped




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The Year 11 Science students practiced these techniques while participating in the workshop entitled: Genetics: In Sickness and In Health. They developed pro ciencies in using and calibrating a pipette, which they then used to perform a serial dilution. This led them to creating a colour mix to use to load a DNA argose gel.

This culminated in the students loading the PCR ampli ed DNA for the Alu insertion of the polymorphism of the PV92 gene onto a DNA argose gel and running a gel electrophoresis to separate allelic patterns. Once the gel image was printed the patterns were compared within the family (a mother, father and their four children). This allowed for the examination of the DNA pro le to determine inheritance through a family pedigree. Interspersed in the laboratory sessions, the students were fortunate to hear from experts currently researching the link between disease and genetic factors with the aim to create personalised health care intervention plans based on individual genetic expression.

These universal molecular biology techniques are used in most medical research laboratories such as the Cancer Genetic Laboratory or the Genetic Epidemiology group (twin studies) and will stand our students in good stead as they further their studies in the eld of Science, contributing to the global community.

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When facing stressful moments, it can be helpful to remember that, in a neurological sense, your adolescent child is, quite literally, not all there. In particular:

- Keep up regular conversations, however resistant your teenager may be. These should be a natural part of life and not a special event when a problem crops up.
- If talking at home is a problem, think about a di erent venue. A car journey with just the two of you and no eye contact allows a low-key,

unthreatening conversation. It is surprising how much is revealed in a car!
